ARTICLE 1- BREEDING PROGRAM

The stallion inspection is part of the breeding program of the KFPS. During the stallion inspection, foalbook stallions are presented in judging rounds; on the basis of the results of this judging, these stallions can be referred to the Central Examination/70 day test. During the selection process, the stallions are subject to minimum requirements, some of which are non-subjective and others of which are subjective in nature. At the end of the selection process, the collected information and assessment is used to decide whether a stallion will be entered in the studbook register. The selection criteria are pedigree, degree of relationship to the population, exterior, movement, capacity for equestrian sports, quality of legs as based on an X-ray assessment, semen quality and other veterinary aspects. The Stallion Inspection Jury advises the Governing Board in regard to the registration of stallions in the studbook register (Art. 108, Standing Orders).

The stallion inspection also involves the inspection of stallions already included in the studbook register.

ARTICLE- 2 JURY

The inspection of stallions for stud service is conducted by the Stallion Inspection Jury appointed on the recommendation of the Council of Members at the bequest of the Board. The Stallion Inspection Jury advises the Governing Board in regard to entering the stallions in the studbook register.

The judging of the stallions entered in the studbook register is done by a jury appointed for this purpose by the Governing Board and shall consist of members of the KFPS Inspection Team, possibly supplemented by members of the KFPS Jury. If a jury member cannot attend the inspection, the Board shall appoint a replacement.

ARTICLE- 3 PARTICIPANTS

- 3.1 All stallions ages 4 through 12 that are registered in the KFPS studbook.
- 3.2 All stallions ages 13 and older that are registered in the KFPS studbook.
- 3.3 All foalbook stallions that were 2 years of age before 1 July of the year in which the first round of judging takes place. Stallions that participated in the Central Examination/70 day test cannot be entered in the first round of judging held in the same calendar year.
- 3.3 Only stallions with a studbook paper may apply for the Stallions judging rounds.

No Bijboek stallions will be permitted to enter.

ARTICLE 4- APPLICATION FOR PARTICIPATION

- 4.1 Applications for the stallion inspection can be made only by sending in the application form on the FPSSA website to the FPSSA office.
- 4.2 To submit an application for a foalbook stallion, a copy of the studbook certificate/laminated paper must be sent to the FPSSA office. The name of the owner of the stallion must appear on this paper.

- 4.3 A currently applicable certificate or letter from the administering vet, of vaccination for influenza and AHS must accompany the application form for every stallion for which an application is being submitted.
- 4.4 The application for the stallions must be submitted before the deadline which shall be published by the FPSSA. If not sent before the deadline, the stallion will not be accepted for inspection

ARTICLE 5- VACCINATION

- 5.1 Proof of registration in the foalbook and the certificate of vaccination for influenza & AHS 1 & 2, including batch numbers and dates of the vaccination, must accompany the application.
- 5.2 The stallions to be presented must have a tongue number or a microchip number. This number must also be recorded on the foalbook/studbook registration.
- 5.3 The applications for stallions already entered in the studbook do not need to be accompanied by a certificate of registration in the studbook or a certificate of vaccination since these certificates can also be submitted/presented on the day of the inspection.
- 5.4 A vaccination certificate shall be considered valid only when it can be confirmed that it applies to the horse participating in the inspection and when it shows that that horse has received the following influenza vaccinations & AHS vaccinations

5.5 Flu Vaccination

- 5.5.1 A basic vaccination series consisting of 2 vaccinations in which the second was given at least and no more than 13 weeks after the first.
- 5.5.2 This to have been followed by an annual vaccination that was administered no more than 12 months after the previous vaccination.
- 5.5.3 All Flu vaccinations must be administered by a vet

5.6 AHS Vaccination

- 5.6.1 All Stallions participating must be vaccinated against AHS by a qualified veterinarian.
- 5.6.2 Vaccination must be done annually with both AHS I and AHS II vaccine.
- 5.6.3 There must be a minimum of 3 weeks between AHS I and AHS II
- 5.6.4 Confirmation of vaccinations must be supplied in the form of a signed passport or letter, initialled and stamped by the veterinarian who administered the vaccination. Stallions that have not been properly vaccinated cannot be presented at the inspection.

ARTICLE- 6 SHOETING

- 6.1 The stallions must be shod all round with standard shoes when presented in every round of judging.
- 6.2 Standard shoes are to be no thicker than 8 mm and no wider than 25 mm and may not be equipped with any wedges, soles or other provisions.
- 6.3 Improper shoeing can be cause for the Stallion Inspection Committee to bar the stallion from the following round of judging.



ARTICLE 7- TESTING FOR UNAUTHORIZED SUBSTANCES

Stallions that participate in the stallion inspection must be free of any unauthorized substances. The KFPS regulations pertaining to unauthorized substances shall apply to the stallion inspection.

ARTICLE 8- JUDGING FOALBOOK STALLIONS

- 8.1 The judging of foalbook stallions for referral to the Central Examination/70 day test, will take place during the first, second and third rounds of judging.
- 8.2 The Stallion Inspection Jury will determine by rounds of judging which stallions will be referred to the next round of judging and ultimately which stallions will be referred to the Central Examination/70 day test

ARTICLE 9- ESTABLISHING HEIGHT AT THE WITHERS

- 9.1 The stallions will be measured during the first round of judging.
- 9.2 This measurement determines whether a stallion can be given the star predicate but is not a factor for referral to the second round of judging.
- 9.3 The stallions will be measured again during the second round of judging.

ARTICLE 10- VETERINARY EXAMINATION

- 10.1 All the veterinary examinations conducted in South Africa for all 3 rounds of the judging must be sent to the FPSSA. These results will be sent to the KFPS for approval from the Stallion Inspection Jury.
- 10.2 All stallions referred during the first round of judging to the second round will undergo a clinical examination during the first round.
- 10.3 Based on these findings, the Stallion Inspection Jury can decide whether or not to withdraw the referral to the second round. The owner will be informed of this before the next round in the inspection.
- 10.4 During the second round of judging, all stallions being referred to the third round will undergo a clinical examination. This veterinary examination will be conducted by one or more veterinarians appointed for this purpose by the Governing Board in conjunction with the FPSSA.
- 10.5 The information obtained from the veterinary examinations and the veterinarians' recommendations to the Stallion Inspection Jury in this regard will be included in the decision-making concerning referrals to the Central Examination/70 day test.



ARTICLE 11- REPORTING

- 11.1 All the stallions inspected during the first round of judging will be scored using linear scoring.
- 11.2 The linear score form will be sent to the owner as soon as possible and will serve as the jury's report.
- 11.3 At the stallion owner's request, the jury can draw up a supplementary report for stallions eliminated during the second and third rounds.
- 11.4 This request should be received by the FPSSA office within 3 working days after the second round of judging.

ARTICLE 12- PERMISSIBLE MARKINGS

- 12.1 The permissible (white) markings noted in the regulations on stallions eligible for being entered in the studbook register are highly undesirable.
- 12.2 In addition to the permissible markings on the head, stallions will also be checked for white markings on the soles of their hooves during the clinical examination conducted during the first round of judging. The presence of white markings on the sole can be reason for not permitting a stallion to participate in the second round.
- 12.4 The owner will be informed of this within three workdays.
- 12.5 In exceptional cases, when a stallion exhibits extremely high quality with reference to the selection criteria, such a stallion can admitted to the second round even though it displays a permissible marking. If such a stallion is ultimately entered in the studbook register, mention of the marking will be included in the assessment report.
- 12.6 Markings on genitalia are judged less severely.

ARTICLE 13-EXAMINATIONS CONDUCTED BY THIRD PARTIES

- 13.1 Should the jury doubt the existence of a certain abnormality over which it is difficult to form the right judgment at the time of the inspection, the jury will then postpone any decision in this regard and refer the stallion for additional examination by a vet appointed by the FPSSA in conjunction with the KFPS appointed vet.
- 13.2 This examination will have to be conducted within 14 days after the inspection. If the jury's suspicion is confirmed, the stallion will be considered rejected and/or not referred to the Central Examination/70 day test and all costs for this examination shall be borne by the owner.

ARTICLE 14- STAR PREDICATE DECLARATION

- 14.1 All stallions present during the second round of judging and having a height at the withers of at least 1.58 cm. will receive the star predicate.
- 14.2 All stallions that have already received star will still need to be presented in all 3 rounds of the Stallion judging rounds.



- 14.3 A stallion that is judged at a home judging and receives a star will not be automatically taken into the Stallion Judging rounds. This stallion will still have to be presented as per the set procedure's set out by the KFPS and fit all the criteria required for a stallion wanting to go to the Stallion rounds

ARTICLE 15- X-RAY TESTING

- 15.1 To participate in the second round of judging, a stallion will have to satisfy the current norms for X-ray testing. In South Africa these test will be requested by the Judges after the 2nd round of judging
- 15.2 As the result of transitional arrangements, when assessing the findings of X-ray testing, a distinction will be made between stallions foaled before January 1, 2007 and stallions foaled on January 1, 2007 or thereafter. The norms are as follows:

15.2.1 Stallions foaled before January 1, 2007:

- 15.3 All X-ray's films and veterinary assessments need to be sent to the FPSSA office within 1 month of the 2nd round of judging. These results will be sent registered mail to the KFPS
- 15.4 The findings will be included in the assessment criteria considered by the Stallion Inspection Jury during the second and following rounds of judging.
- 15.5 The secondary findings revealed during X-ray testing such as ringbones, side bones and calcification of the processus extensorius, etc. will be considered in the Stallion Inspection Jury's decision-making process but will not essentially impede participation in the second round of judging
- 15.6 The findings of the X-ray testing will be included in the reporting after the end of the Central Examination/70 day test.
- 15.7 X-ray films can be assessed only if they were made by one of the clinics approved by the KFPS. for the Netherlands, these are the "inspection veterinarians". For other countries, the choice of

- such a veterinarian must be made in consultation with the KFPS. A list of these vets is available from the FPSSA office. The films must be made according to the protocol for this procedure.
- 15.8 When tested, the stallions must at least be 26 months old.
- 15.9 The owner is responsible for any risks involved during the stallion's stay at the clinic for testing purposes.
- 15.10 The X-ray films are assessed by a committee appointed by the KFPS.
- 15.11 The original X-ray films will remain the property of the KFPS for further research.
- 15.12 Unless the criteria will be changed by the KFPS, the findings of the X-ray testing will apply within the framework of stallion selection throughout the life of the stallion.
- 15.13 An appeal against the findings of the X-ray testing can be submitted to the KFPS no later than two weeks after the assessment date.
- 15.14 The reassessment will be conducted by a reassessment committee, the owner being responsible for the costs involved.
- 15.14.1 The appeal procedure involves two elements:
- 15.14.2 A reassessment of the existing films.
- 15.14.3 A first assessment of the new films. The first set of films is also included in this assessment.
- 15.14.4 The findings of the X-ray testing have to be made available to the KFPS by a date established by the KFPS.
- 15.14.5 If the findings do not reach the KFPS by this date, the stallion will be excluded from participation in the second round of judging.

ARTICLE 16 SEMEN ANALYSIS

- 16.1 To participate in the second round of judging, a stallion will have to satisfy the current norms for semen testing. In South Africa this test will be requested by the Judges after the 2nd round of judging
- 16.2 **Stallions that are 3 years of age during the calendar year in which the second round of judging is held:**
600 x 106 TNB, morphology: at least 50.0%, motility: at least 50%
or
800 x 106 TNB, morphology: at least 45.0%, motility: at least 50%.
- 16.3 **Stallions that are 4 years of age or older during the calendar year in which the second round of judging is held:**
1000 x 106 TNB, morphology: at least 50.0%, motility: at least 50%
or
1200 x 106 TNB, morphology: at least 45.0%, motility: at least 50%.
- 16.4 Stallions with incorrect genitals are barred from the second round of judging.
- 16.5 Findings from the semen analysis will be assessed only if this testing was conducted at an agency selected for this purpose by the KFPS. For other countries, the choice of such a



- veterinarian must be made in consultation with the KFPS. A list of these vets is available from the FPSSA office.
- 16.6 Stallions being tested must be unshod.
 - 16.7 The owner is responsible for any risks during stabling, semen collection and transport.
 - 16.8 The owner must present the stallion's registration certificate.
 - 16.9 The findings of the semen testing will be determined on the basis of two collections taken about one hour apart.
 - 16.10 If semen analysis has been done, then the findings of the semen testing is valid only if the testing was conducted within 12 months prior to the second round of judging. Stallions that participated previously in a second round of judging will thus have to undergo semen testing again.
 - 16.11 All semen results and veterinary assessment must be sent to the FPSSA office within 1 month of the 2nd round of judging. These results will be sent registered mail to the KFPS
 - 16.12 The findings of the semen testing will be assessed by a committee assigned by the KFPS for this purpose. This committee can recommend that the testing be repeated.
 - 16.13 The findings of the semen testing have to be made available to the KFPS by a date established by the KFPS in conjunction with the FPSSA. If the findings do not reach the KFPS by this date, the stallion will be excluded from participation in the second round of judging.

ARTICLE 17- DNA TESTING

- 17.1 To participate in the second round of judging, a stallion will have to satisfy the current norms for DNA testing. In South Africa these test will be requested by the Judges after the 2nd round of judging
The results of DNA testing for undesirable characteristics will play a greater role in the selection of young stallions.
 - 17.1.1 Once DNA tests become available, stallions will have to be tested previous(after) to the second round of judging.
 - 17.1.2 The findings of this testing will be included in the selection criteria during the second and following rounds of judging, but will not be cause to eliminate a stallion in advance from participating in the Central Examination/ 70 day test.
 - 17.1.3 All DNA results and veterinary assessment must be sent to the FPSSA office. These results will be sent registered mail to the KFPS

17.2 Chestnut factor

- 17.2.1 The DNA test for the chestnut factor will be conducted between the referral to the Central Examination/70 day test and the beginning of the Central Examination/70 day test.
- 17.2.2 Carriers of the chestnut factor foaled on or after January 1, 2007 will not be eliminated in advance from participating in the Central Examination/70 day test.
- 17.2.3 carriership will be included, however, in the final assessment made during the

- Central Examination/70 day test.
- 17.2.4 Stallions foaled before January 1, 2007 should have tested negative for the chestnut factor to be eligible to participate in the Central Examination.

ARTICLE 18- FIRST ROUND OF JUDGING

- 18.1 During the first round of judging, the stallions are assessed primarily on exterior (trueness to breed, conformation and legs) and movement (the three basic gaits). In general, the norm for referral to the second round of judging is the same as the norm applied for the star predicate.
- 18.2 The assessment done during the first round of judging consists of a presentation in hand the ring and, for older stallions, a ridden or driven presentation. In Hand in the ring, the stallions will be judged on exterior and the walk and trot.
- 18.3 After the individual presentation of the stallions, the jury will announce while the stallions are being led around the ring which stallions will be going on to the second round.
- 18.4 If older stallions are being judged, an announcement will be made as to whether they will be going on to the ridden and driven presentations.
- 18.5 Stallions that become 4 years old during the calendar year of their first round of judging are presented ridden and driven during the first round of judging when the jury will look closely at the three basic gaits. Whether the stallion will be included in the second round of judging will be determined after this presentation.
- 18.6 The stallions referred to the second round of judging will receive an onsite veterinary examination, by a vet approved by the KFPS in consultation with the FPSSA
- 18.7 The stallions will receive linear scores during the first round of judging.

N.B. for South Africa

- 18.8 In South Africa at this stage both the 1st and 2nd round will be conducted within a day or two of each other.
- 18.8.1 Any stallion that is not good enough for round 2 will be eliminated during/ after the 1st round inspection.
- 18.8.2 The stallion going through to the 2nd round will be required to be presented at the allotted time organised by the National Show organisers.
- 18.8.3 After the 2nd round of judging, the judges will inform the stallion owner if the stallion needs to have Semen, x-ray and DNA Tests. See articles 15,16,17 of these Stallion Inspection Rules
- 18.8.4 Stallions not requested for these test are eliminated from any further inspection rounds
- 18.8.5 Once the FPSSA have received all these test results they will be sent to the KFPS for evaluation by the Stallion Jury. If the stallion meets all the requirement of the Stallion Jury the stallion owner will be notified that there stallion qualifies to compete in the 3rd round of Stallion judging.

18.8.6 Should the stallion not qualify after the evaluation processes of the Stallion Jury the stallion will not be permitted to continue to any further rounds

ARTICLE 19-SECOND ROUND OF JUDGING

- 19.1 Stallions can participate in the second round of judging only when referred to this round of judging by the Stallion Inspection Jury.
- 19.2 The stallions must also have met the established norms for X-ray testing and semen quality. For South Africa see Article 18.8
- 19.3 The second round of judging consists of an assessment of a presentation in the ring (free movement). The emphasis here is on assessing the trot and canter.
- 19.4 The Stallion Inspection Jury will determine whether the stallion will be referred to the third round of judging as based on the following assessments and criteria:
 - 19.4.1 Assessment made during the first round of judging (including the veterinary examination).
 - 19.4.2 Exterior and basic gaits assessed during the second round of judging.
 - 19.4.3 Pedigree (breeding value and degree of relationship to the population).
 - 19.4.4 Height at withers (at least 1.58 cm for three-year-old stallions and at least 1.60 cm for stallions four years of age and older).
 - 19.4.5 Findings of X-ray testing.
 - 19.4.6 Findings of DNA testing.
- 19.5 The stallions referred to the third round of judging will receive a veterinary examination by a vet approved by the FPSSA.

ARTICLE 20- THIRD ROUND OF JUDGING

- 20.1 Stallions can participate in the third round of judging only when referred to this round of judging by the Stallion Inspection Jury.
- 20.2 The third round of judging consists of an assessment of a presentation in hand. The stallions will be shown at the walk and trot on a triangular track and free moving in the ring.
- 20.3 The stallion inspection/re-inspection jury will determine whether the stallion will be referred to the Central Examination/70 day test as based on the following assessments and criteria:
 - 20.3.1 Assessments made during the first and second rounds of judging (including veterinary examination).
 - 20.3.2 Exterior and basic gaits assessed during the third round of judging.
 - 20.3.3 Pedigree (breeding value and degree of relationship with the population).
 - 20.3.4 Findings of X-ray testing.
 - 20.3.5 Findings of DNA testing.

N.B. for South Africa

- 20.4 In South Africa at this stage the 3rd round will be conducted at HOY 2015 in mid Feb in Gauteng.
- 20.4.1 Only stallions that have received written confirmation for the KFPS/FPSSA may continue to the 3rd round.
- 20.4.2 The stallion qualifying for the 3rd round will be required to be presented at the allotted time organised by the HOY Show organisers.
- 20.4.3 All the information received from the 3rd round of judging will be used in the assessment of the stallion along with all the information received from the previous rounds.
- 20.4.4 This information will be presented to the Stallion Inspection Jury in the Netherlands
- 20.4.5 If the stallion qualifies for the 70day test, the owner will be notified in writing by the KFPS/FPSSA
- 19.6.6 If the stallion is not successful in qualifying for the 70 day test, the owner has the option to apply for a Foal book breeding permission. **IT IS NOT GUARANTEED THAT BECAUSE THE STALLION HAS MADE IT TO THE 3RD ROUND THAT IT WILL AUTOMATICALLY RECEIVE BREEDING PERMISSION.** The stallion owner will be notified by the KFPS/FPSSA if there application has been successful.

ARTICLE 21 CONDITIONS FOR REFERRAL TO PARTICIPATION IN THE CENTRAL EXAMINATION

- 21.1 It is during the third round of judging that stallions are referred to the Central Examination/70 day test.
- 21.2 To participate in the Central Examination, their pedigree will have to be verified by means of DNA testing. In the event that the pedigree is not confirmed, the stallion's referral to the Central Examination/70 day test will be withdrawn unless the Stallion Inspection Jury decides otherwise.

ARTICLE 22 ASSESSMENT OF STALLIONS' DAMS

- 22.1 The dams and possibly other horses related to a stallion referred to the Central Examination/70 day test will be assessed by the KFPS Inspection Team.
- 22.2 The findings will be included as factors in arriving at the decision as to whether to enter a stallion in the studbook register after the Central Examination has been conducted.
- 22.3 Regulations concerning the Central Examination/70 day test are given in the Conditions for Central Examination/70 day test.

ARTICLE 23- SECOND-CHANCE ASSESSMENT

- 23.1 Stallions that have participated in the first round of judging but have not been referred to the Central Examination/70 day test will be given a second chance to qualify.
- 23.2 This second-chance assessment will consist of a ridden or driven presentation, an assessment of the exterior (in hand), and a veterinary examination. Based on this second-chance assessment, the Stallion Inspection Jury can refer stallions to the Central Examination/70 day test.
- 23.3 During the second-chance assessment, the same criteria are used for referral to the Central Examination/70 day test as given in Article 1.
- 23.4 The basic gaits (both to the left and the right as instructed by the jury) are judged when the stallion is presented ridden or driven.
- 23.5 Based on the ridden or driven presentation, the jury will decide if the stallion will participate in the exterior judging. These results will then determine if the stallion will undergo a veterinary examination that will then determine the referral to the Central Examination/70 day test.
- 23.6 To participate in a second-chance assessment, the stallion must have participated in a first round of judging as part of the stallion inspection that took place during the same calendar year as the second-chance assessment. In South Africa the second-chance assessment will have to carry over to the next year.
- 23.7 He must also have satisfied the requirements pertaining to X-ray testing (Article 16) and semen testing (Article 17). The second-chance assessment is held previous to the Central Examination/70 day test.

ARTICLE 24- CENTRAL EXAMINATION

- 24.1 The goal of the Central Examination/70 day test is to establish the capacity of a stallion as a riding horse, driving horse or carthorse as well as to collect information regarding health, character and stable behaviour.
- 24.2 The Central Examination/70 day test lasts 10 weeks. Participation in the Central Examination depends on a referral made by the Stallion Inspection Jury.
- 24.3 The Stallion Inspection Jury is responsible for assessing the stallions and reporting their performances.
- 24.4 During the Central Examination/70 day test, the Stallion Inspection Jury is advised by two members of the Performance Jury appointed by the Board.
- 24.5 Stallions can participate in the Central Examination/70 day test only if they have been referred to it by the stallion inspection jury and have participated in the preparation for it, which is organized by the KFPS.



ARTICLE 25 – DATES

- 25.1 The dates for the judging rounds will be organised each year by the FPSSA in conjunction with the KFPS.
- 25.2 These dates will be published in advance and every effort will be taken to organise the dates to coincide with other shows.
- 25.3 Should this not be possible the cost will be incurred by the stallion owners

ARTICLE 26 – VENUE

- 26.1 The venue will be determined by the FPSSA in conjunction with the KPFS.
- 26.2 The venue will be independent of the stallion owners and meet all the requirements for the Central Examination/70 day test.

ARTICLE 27 – COSTS

27.1 Judging Rounds

- 27.1.1 All the fees for the judging rounds are available on the FPSSA website under Fee Structure.
- 27.1.2 These judging fees are due at the time the stallion owner submits the application
- 27.1.3 Should the application be withdrawn at any stage a 20% handling fee will be charged
- 27.1.4 Where possible the FPSSA will try to co-ordinate these stallion judging rounds with an FPSSA show or with other stallions needing to be judged.
- 27.1.5 If the stallion is presented at an FPSSA show, all the judges will be accommodated and looked after by the FPSSA. However, should these judging round not be at an FPSSA show, it will be up to the stallion owners account.
- 27.1.6 If more than one stallion is being presented, the cost will be divided per stallion.

27.2 Central Examination/70 day test

- 27.2.1 All the cost of the 70 day test will be for the account of the stallion owner.
- 27.2.2 Should more than one stallion be examined at each test, where possible these cost will be divided between the participating stallions
- 27.2.3 The cost would include accommodation, venue or stable hire, travel, food, etc
- 27.2.4 All the arrangements for the examination/test will be made by the FPSSA office in consultation with the KFPS.



ARTICLE 28-GENERAL

- 28.1 All applications for any of the Stallion Judging rounds must be submitted to the FPSSA office.
- 28.2 Should the application not be submitted through the FPSSA office the application will not be processed.

THE FPSSA ARE NOT INVOLVED IN THE JUDGING ANY OF THE JUDGING ROUND. THE DECISION AS TO WHETHER THE STALLION CONTINUES TO THE NEXT ROUND, IS UP THE TO STALLION INSPECTION JURY.
